How the Months Got Their Names

March (Martius) was named for Mars, the god of war, because this was the month when active military campaigns resumed.

May (Maius) and June (Junius) were also named for goddesses Maia and Juno.

April (Aprilis) is thought to stem from the Latin aperio, meaning "to open"—a reference to the opening buds of springtime.

The rest of the months were numbered; their original names in Latin meant the fifth (Quintilis), sixth (Sextilis), seventh (September), eighth (October), ninth (November), and tenth (December) month.

Eventually, January (Januarius) and February (Februarius) were added to the end of the year, giving all 12 months proper names.

January was named after Janus, the Roman god of beginnings and transitions. February's name is believed to stem from *Februa*, an ancient festival dedicated to ritual springtime cleaning and washing.

December 1 is the First Sunday of Advent, marking the beginning of the Advent season.

December 6 is Saint Nicholas Day. The patron saint of children is the model for Santa Claus and gift-giving. **December 7** is National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day.

December 8 is Bodhi Day in the Buddhist calendar, celebrating Buddha's enlightenment; it's celebrated in a way that's similar to how Christians celebrate Christmas to honor Jesus Christ.

December 13 is St. Lucia's Day, which has long been associated with festivals of light. Before the Gregorian calendar reform in 1752, her feast day occurred on the shortest day of the year (hence the saying "Lucy light, Lucy light, shortest day and longest night").

December 15 is Bill of Rights Day.

December 17 is Wright Brothers Day.

December 21 is the Winter Solstice, the astronomical day when the hemisphere is tilted as far away from the Sun as possible. Starting in ancient times, people celebrated the rebirth of the Sun event through Yule.

December 25 is Christmas Day, a Christian holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. The reason for the season.

December 25 also marks the beginning of Hanukkah this year, the 8-day Jewish festival of lights.

There is one thing we want to make sure is clear to all. Some have commented about having to compete against those that are playing from a forward tee box (shorter distance). Keep in mind that with the new handicap system, your handicap will be affected not only by the difficulty of the golf course but also by the tee box you are playing from on any given day. If a golfer is playing from the forward tee his handicap will be multiple strokes lower than if he were playing back. If there is anything about the survey or the questions that you don't understand, please feel free to call either Anthony Serritella or Scott Lee. We will do our best to clear up any confusion that you may have. Also, if you have not received the survey email, text us your correct email address. HISTORIAN REPORT

Fellow Members,

First of all I would like to Thank Rich Schroeder for doing my job since I told him that I wasn't going to interview myself, so he did it.

On to what I wanted to write about. I have been asked many a time what the numbers mean when you get the newsletter and the tennis names and scores are listed. I will give you a quick explanation of the scoring and a little history about the BTC Tennis Group. First we only play doubles tennis. Two players on each side of the net. Scoring is by the point. Each point won for your side increases your score until you win a game. Scoring is 0 (called love), 15, 30, 40 and the next point would be game. But you have to win by two points so if it is 40-40 (called deuce) the next point won is called "Ad (advantage)" and then you will have to win the next point to win the game or it would go back to deuce. The scores listed in the Newsletter by the names are games won/games played. So if it says Baldermann 15/25 Al had a good day and won 15 out of 25 games that he played. Since everyone who shows up gets to play if you have 16 players you use 4 courts for two hours and play one set (6 games won) with each partner. If 17 guys show up 3 courts play that way and the one court with five players rotates one player out and just plays four games at a time (each player serves once) then another player sits and the other four serve one game each. Every Tennis Chairman that we have had has been as fair as possible since you have to try to put similar abilities players on the same court. It makes for good exercise and good tennis matches when the players are pretty even.

As to how the BTC got into tennis. In 1968 the four Major Tournaments allowed professional players and TV started broadcasting more Tournaments. Equipment improved with Wilson and Prince coming out with the T2000 and aluminum and graphite composition racquets that were lighter and more powerful to use. The BTC, led by Phil Peecher started playing tennis in 1978. His Committee also included Ed Roche, Bob Riordan and Bill Cleary. Phil, an Architect by trade, and Bill were still playing in the early 2000's when I started with them. Al Baldermann, our current Tennis Chairman, started in 1979 with the Club and with the Tennis Group. He gave me a lot of information about our Clubs Fuzzy Ballers. Tennis was played at the Oak Lawn Tennis Club. There were so many players that they had two time frames, 3-5 pm and 5-7 pm. Gary Bybee told me that he couldn't get on the early shift unless someone was hurt or sick. They were using all 6 courts and even had a waiting list at one time to join them. By the time I joined with them in 2002 they had moved out of Oak Lawn into Wimbledon in Palos on Ridgeland Ave. However after a few years there they had to move again because courts were being changed to Racquetball. So for the last 22 years BTC Tennis has been played at the Park Forest Tennis Club. In 2002 there were still all 6 courts being used but we were down to about 30 players. Today that number is at about 20-24. Considering how many less Members we have in the Club that is still good and makes for some great matches. After Phil Peecher's Chairmanship, Ed Wood took over for many years. When he couldn't play anymore Gary Bybee was Chairman one year and Pat McShane took over until work forced him out and now Al Baldermann has been the Tennis Chairman since 2013. I hope that this gives you a little more input into the Tennis Group of the BTC and if you are interested all Members in good standing are welcome to try it out. There are two days of play now with tennis not only on Tuesdays from 3-5 pm but also on Thursdays from 10:30 am-12:30 pm. I hope that this was helpful and Thanks for listening.
